

Hello Comrades. Another Christmas season to enjoy! Please take the time to do so with family and friends.

I would like to thank the many volunteers at Branches, Zones, Districts, our Ladies Auxiliaries - and of course many, many thanks to our fantastic staff at Provincial HQ led by Executive Director Pam and Assistant Executive Director Juanita, for helping and guiding us with this important work! Without all of you, our work just could not continue. Thank you again!

Following is an update on some of the programs I have been working on.

Leave The Streets Behind

Through the generosity of our Legion Branches and Ladies Auxiliaries,



throughout our Command, money has been raised through various events to support the Homeless Veterans Program. To date over 3 million dollars has been dispersed from the Ontario Command Homeless Veterans Fund and over 100,000 dollars from our Ladies Auxiliary. We note here that there has been no financial support from any level of government. More than 1158 Homeless Veterans have been identified in 199 communities. Of these Veterans, 129 have identified as females since the beginning of the program. We have noticed that there are many Veterans we assist that have families with children and in the past year we have assisted 53 families. (Note all figures shown above are as

of 01 Dec 2023 and it is to be noted that August was the busiest month on record assisting 15 new veterans).

I want to thank Districts, Zones, and our Branches for stepping up to the plate and providing contacts who are willing and able to assist at the local levels with our Homeless Program. As our Districts are very different in many ways, we have determined that this role can be done at either the Zone or District level and sometimes even at the Branch level. Many of our Provincial VSS Committee Chairs have taken on the role and this is an incredible help to our Provincial team. There have been some fantastic success stories at local levels that would never have been accomplished without this local help!

Leave the Streets Behind has also partnered with Toronto City Police, Military Veterans Wellness Program (MVWP) and this has proved to be an invaluable partnership. The MVWP is growing exponentially to other Police forces, and we now have contacts with Waterloo Regional Police, Durham Regional Police, Peel Regional Police, and many OPP contacts throughout the Command. This really helps us identify Veterans needing assistance.

Another important partner of our Program is Built for Zero Canada (BFZ-C). This relationship is growing and proving to be valuable to both our organizations - as both of us have the same objective.



I also would like to mention and to thank a very much closer partner in our Ladies Auxiliary who always step forward when needed.



Ruck to Remember has been incredible and many thanks go out to Comrade Lino and his team who again have had an incredible year! I also announced that this year's "Golden Boot" award goes to District E with a total donation of \$107,500.00. Congratulations! Accepting the award from President Derek and I was District E Commander Rick Preston.

In summary it has been very busy with the program, however it is very satisfying knowing the help the program gives to so many Veterans. I would like to thank Comrades Pam, Juanita, Jen, and Lisa S. and all our PSO staff - but also thanks to **all** our HQ staff as everything they do in their

day-to-day work affects our Homeless Veterans very much!

In closing, I would also like to thank everyone for the get well wishes and the wonderful words of encouragement to me during my recent health issues. You cannot know how much this means to me during this difficult time.

I do wish to announce that I will be letting my name stand as Vice President of Dominion Command at the upcoming convention in Saint John NB and I humbly ask for your support!

On behalf of Linda and myself, I want to take this opportunity to wish everyone a Happy Holiday Season. We are hoping 2024 will be a great year for The Royal Canadian Legion, all its members and our many wonderful friends!

Diane Condon Provincial Bursary Chair

Comrades all; Bursary has proven to be a very challenging position and certainly made me work towards bettering its position as a charity worthy of support. I must thank all the District Chairs, our CF President, Comrade Marg Emery and our Co Ordinator, Jen Leclair for their support and hard work. When you have a good team things go much easier.

Started by the LA over 30 years ago, it was taken over by Command and made part of the Charitable Foundation, which is a registered charity. This requires reporting to Revenue Canada and the distribution of T4A slips. All funds for bursary are accounted for separately and the donations received constitute our budget on an annual basis. Pre covid, we had 500 applications to the program. During covid that dropped to 292. Despite the pandemic we were able to support these students, who, for the most part, were studying from home. They still had to pay for books, tuition, etc., all of



which have a high cost. However, the number dropped again the following year to 262, and we appeared to be losing ground with the program. Up until the December of that school year we only had 9 applications in house. That necessitated action on our behalf.

After a complete review of our procedures including the application process, and, after input from outside sources, it was determined that we should look at the application with a view to making it simpler and easier to follow. We have done that, and at our last Bursary meeting the chairs from the districts

voted in favor of the changes made. We now have an application which is easier for the students to follow. In addition, we needed to get noticed. There are many bursaries available to qualified students, most of which are in the \$1,000 range. In an effort to outdo them and get our share of the bursary market, we increased the award to \$1,500. However, our budget would not support that amount, and the Charitable Foundation, after review, put the award at \$1,250.

Comrades, to date we have 51 applications in house for this current academic year, which is a vast improvement of prior years. The new application is receiving favorable reviews, and most certainly the award amount is going to be a boost to the bursary program.

Currently, the bursary program is open to all veterans, their spouses, children and grandchildren. Great grandchildren can apply through the branches. During our June Bursary meeting, we did discuss opening up the program to include affiliate members and all LA members. This, unfortunately, is not possible due to funding. We are reliant on the branches for funding through donations. As it stands, we are an older charitable venture and not as popular as Homeless Vets or Service Dogs. Most of the branch donations go to them, and we haven't seen an increase in donations for quite some time. We know that there are significant funds being held by the branches in their Poppy accounts, and we ask that you request them to donate those funds to all our charitable ventures, including Bursary. Only with their funding will we be allowed to grow. Don't forget, this is all part of


supporting our Veterans and their families, something we are mandated to do, and something we do with pleasure.

For the 2022-2023 fiscal year, the Veterans Comfort Fund received total donations of \$170,900.00, interest income of \$41,533.34 and \$39,146.20 on program expenditures, leaving a balance of \$173,287.14. Donations for VCF were up 56.62% from last year.



For the 2022-2023 fiscal year, the Joe Sweeney Fund (a.k.a. Leave the Streets Behind / Homeless Veterans' Program) received total donations of \$84,152.40, interest income of \$18,010.74 and

\$33,330.78 on program expenditures leaving a balance of \$68,832.36. Donations for the JSF Fund were up 31.30% from last year.

For the 2022-2023 fiscal year, the Service Dogs Program received total donations of \$10,295.30 from the public. Donations from Legion levels for the SDP go to the Provincial Poppy Fund to be kept there until needed which is why this figure seems low. There was \$385.10 on program expenditures leaving a balance of \$9,910.30. Donations for this program were up 235% from last year.

I am happy to report that donations for this year were up about 12% for the Charitable Foundation over last year. Our branches and our Ladies Auxiliaries always put others first especially as the cost of everything has skyrocketed.

Our Committee of the Whole for Charitable Foundation met on Friday, November 17, 2023 where we approved 73 applications for a total of **\$671,332.00**. I believe this is one of the highest amounts we have had for distribution all because of every one of you who donate to the Charitable Foundation. Thank You!

Comrades, as a committee we made significant changes for 2024 as we are going digital. The Command website has been updated with all the new forms and directions and there is even a sample grant for applicants to use as a template. We are very excited about this move. We will also be using electronic funds transfers for successful grants and will work with the recipients to ensure a presentation is made which includes branch and Ladies Auxiliaries representation.

Special thanks to the Ladies Auxiliaries as always for their support and another big thank you to the branches, zones and districts for their donations, without all of you there would be no Charitable Foundation. A huge thank you to our committee members who are enthusiastic about the work they do for the Charitable Foundation and come to the table each year prepared to go to bat not only for their own Districts but other Districts who would benefit from a larger grant if the funds are available. We have a great team!

I would like to thank Hailey Gobin to our Committee Coordinator who worked so hard ensuring all the necessary paperwork was uploaded to the website for this coming application season and just does a great job overall. Thank you to all staff at Ontario Command who have any part in providing a service for CF especially Pam, Juanita and Sue. They all do a great job.

Diane Condon Honours and Awards Chair

Since being named to the Honors and Awards Chair, I have developed a deeper understanding of what it takes to be recognized by your peers. It never ceases to amaze me that we have people within our organization who can, and have devoted so much of their time and effort to making the Legion a better place for all members.

In this calendar year to date, we have received 139 applications for Honors and Awards. Of that number, 117 were for Life Membership, 19 were for MSM's and there were 3 applications for the Palm Leaf to the MSM. After careful review by the committee, we declined 33 Life memberships, 5 MSM's and 1 Palm Leaf to the MSM. Having done that, the final submissions were 84 Life Memberships, 14 MSM's, and 2 Palm Leaf to the MSM.

There seems to be as lot of confusion over what makes a good citation and what constitutes the requirement of "over and above". Many of our members contribute their time volunteering to do a variety of things around the branch. When they have continued to do so over a period of years, an executive committee might feel that they should be given a life membership in recognition. This does not necessarily meet the criteria for "over and above" and the application is usually denied. We can only refer them to the Ritual, Awards and Protocol manual which is available on the Dominion website. In that manual, starting on page 14, they will find the criteria for all awards. Following the guidelines, including dates of service in chronological order, and a good citation increases the chance of the award being approved.

It has been said, that when the branch feels a Life membership is in order for an individual, it should be given, even if the criteria for "over and above" is not met. Comrades, as you all know, the only way to make things change is by resolution. If you have a strong opinion on how Honors and Awards should be given, then it is up to you to try and change things.






Our program should be talked about

thanks to the efforts of our publisher, Fenety Marketing. As of the end of October, we had received a total net income in the amount of \$1,933,063.25 since we first introduced this program in 2013. And also remember that these funds assist us in not having to impose any increase to the Provincial per capita tax.

The success of our program is dependent on each branch having a Branch MSRB Coordinator who is continually promoting our program and actively involved in recruiting Veteran submissions through their branch and community. Because what has been somewhat disappointing is to see that there are still several of our branches who have not as much as submitted one Veteran submission over this tenyear period.



I do not for one minute believe that there are no Veterans who have lived or are living within these communities and the surrounding areas of where these branches are located. So, I put out the challenge to any branch who has yet to submit any Veteran submission to recruit submissions and have them submitted for publication in our Volume #11 book. Of course, we also ask that all branches do the same. And please do not hold onto submissions until the last minute. Please submit them to your Provincial Coordinator as soon as you have received them.

I do want to thank all of you who have been involved in our program to date to make it the success that it has been. Your support and dedication is truly appreciated. I ask that you continue to promote the

program through a concentrated effort during year #11 of our program.

The information we gather from this survey is used for our Fact Sheet which is used to promote the awesome work our Branches and members do within Ontario Command. Information such as...volunteer hours, the number of times the Branches offered their facilities free of charge to community groups, funds spent in support of community groups are just a few that we need from the Branches as these are not recorded through any other reports sent to Ontario Command.



The current Fact Sheet of 2019 needs major updating, so we need the Branches help in completing this Branch Survey.

Facts from the last Branch Survey resulted with...

- Continued to support Boy Scouts, Girl Guides, Army/Air/Sea/Navy Cadets, and other Youth Programs in excess of \$1.3 million
- Other donations to local charities amount to over \$1.5 million, not from Poppy Trust Funds
- Donations to local Community Projects totaled over \$1.3 million
- Ontario Command Members annually put in over 444,500 volunteer hours
- In 2018 Ontario Command Branches had over 6552 volunteer staff and employed over 1300 full time and part-time staff
- Ontario Command Branches offered their facilities free of charge to community groups for over 27,600 occasions in 2018

These are awesome facts and the only way we can state these is through information gathered through the Branch Survey.

The last Branch Survey of 2018 had Branch participation of 92% and as of December 15th, we only had 63% participation. So, Comrades, I ask for your continued help by completing the Branch Survey and sending it into Ontario Command so that we can update our Fact Sheet. The more information we have the better it will be as we will have more accurate information for the Fact Sheet. If your Branch has misplaced the Survey form, please contact me at <u>carolyn.mccaul@sympatico.ca</u> and I will be happy to send a form to you. To those Branches that have already completed the task, thank you for your help!

My final note is that Public Relations is about communicating, and this does not mean with just the Media. First, we must communicate with each other amongst our committees in order to get the information out to the Public. So Comrades, please "Keep the Communication Lines Open!"

Cudos and thanks to the three Districts now offering a Seniors Literary Program. District F started the ball, District E has carried it, and now District A, has entered the game. In addition, I hear District E has added a category specifically for Veterans' stories and poems. Seniors love discounts, included with this report is a listing of companies, places, etc., offering discounts to Seniors, some for the asking. Please share.



Sunnybrook, Parkwood, and Perley-Rideau experienced minimal

casualties during Covid. There were no double digit Covid related deaths from either. Staff continue with their due diligence, units are locked down as quickly and as often as necessary to contain illness, keeping everyone, patients, staff, and visitors safe. Sunnybrook reports of their 286 Veteran beds, occupancy is at 76%. There is currently no waitlist for Contract or Preferred admission Veterans. The Palliative Care Unit has 52 of 56 beds occupied. Occupancy is usually at 95%. Veterans get priority if a waitlist. Parkwood Institute reports of the 119 beds available, Veterans occupy 88. At Perley, in Ottawa Veterans formerly housed in other wings of the facility have now been moved, subject to their approval, to the 'Rideau Veterans Residence'. Perley reports no 'waiting list' for qualified veterans (WWII & Korea), though 19 are waiting for 'preferred beds'. In September, there were 72 Other Qualified

Veterans (OQFs) occupying beds. These numbers change by the day. The Seniors Village, a LTC centre associated with and attached to Perley Health, still maintains a 28%-30% unofficial occupancy of veterans. The residents of the Seniors Village are welcome to use the amenities, games and workshops of Perley Health.

The Seniors Report presented at the 2023 Provincial Executive Council Meeting, in November, included a list of organizations, companies, etc. that provide a Seniors' Discount of one form or another. Your District and Zone Commanders would each have received the listing distributed by email. Hopefully, you, your family and friends make use of it. Some companies have Seniors' Discounts not advertised nor promoted. So, if over 55, take a risk, ask if a discount is available. Keep in mind, the young kid at the checkout, may not ask you, for fear of insulting that nice lady who appears as old as Grama.

As the New Year approaches, ugly winter weather is not far beyond, with cold temperatures and snowstorm warnings in the forecast. As you're wishing you didn't have to go out, think of our seniors. Give a call, make sure all's good, groceries, internet, cable, driveway shovelled, etc. Lend a hand when physically possible, and show you care.

After the track meet, the Committee held a meeting chaired by Comrade Derek in my absence. During the meeting, the committee selected the team led by Comrades Laura Sivers and Kiryn Crook to represent Team O in Sherbrooke. Additionally, a motion was proposed to invite Athletics Ontario to be a part of the Provincial Track & Field committee. We felt it was necessary to do this to keep our program active and promote it not only to the Track and Field community but also to other sports in the province. The contest has been called the Royal Canadian Legion Poster Poem and Essay competition since its inception and the old adage "if it's not broke don't fix it" comes to mind.



The second change is the addition of the Video Competition at the National Level, many will remember that Ontario Command did have a video competition, but it was put on hold as the caliber of entries was not what we considered to be adequate. Ontario Command has agreed to try the competition again and all entries will now be submitted through National, and each Province will review and judge the entries for their province. The competition will only be open to Intermediate and

Senior for this year. After the completion of this year's competition the Youth Education Committee will evaluate at our meeting in June if we wish to continue to participate.

Public Speaking will be starting soon, and I am pleased to announce that the Provincial Competition will be held at Br. 101 Long Branch in District D on May 4, 2024 start time is 11am. I hope you will be able to join us for a day of great speeches, the students' talents never cease to amaze me.

Of the 399 Legion branches in Ontario, 204 are blessed to be supported by Ladies' Auxiliaries. Provincially the L.A.s donated \$1,175,732 to branches. In addition, \$435,563 was donated to Veterans Welfare projects, Bursaries, the Charitable Foundation and other worthy causes.

Unfortunately the news is not all good. We have seen a number of our Auxiliaries surrender their charter, and for many reasons. Aging, declining numbers, and ongoing disputes with their Branch that couldn't be fixed. It's really too bad because by working together, both organizations could have been stronger.



We are currently, working on setting up our next Provincial Convention, it will be held from Saturday May 25 – Tuesday May 28, 2024. It will be held in Newmarket at the Roy Tweenie Complex. We are looking forward to having a good turnout of delegates and observers this year.

All Officers will be busy during the months of April and May, attending Zone Conventions and unfortunately that means we will not be able to attend any of the District Conventions. We are finding it to be extremely expensive to attend the District Conventions, so it has been suggested that instead of being there in person, we will supply a report which can be read at the convention on our behalf. Our Provincial Sports is getting ready to begin in March of 2024. We hope all 4 tournaments will go smoothly. Comrade Kelly Scott has done an excellent job making sure the tournaments are run smoothly and well attended.

Our up-dated By-laws can be viewed on the Legion Command website, these are not printable, if your branch wishes a copy, they can be ordered through our Provincial Secretary – Kim Adams. We hope each Branch that has an Auxiliary will obtain a copy. A couple of major changes that need to be recognized are: Auxiliaries <u>NO LONGER NEED</u> Branch approval prior to planning a fund raising event. Also when an Auxiliary chooses to surrender their charter, after all bills are paid, and obligations met, the monies remaining shall be divided equally between the Branch and the Ladies Auxiliary Command.

WHEN AN AUXILIARY CLOSES, THERE IS A PROCEDURE THEY MUST FOLLOW. We are finding that this is not being done. They must notify our Command, they must notify the Branch, they must hold a special General meeting, notify each member of this meeting, there must be 2/3 majority vote of members in attendance, once this is done, a final year to date financial report and audit must be done. THE CHARTER, MINUTES AND FINANCIALS ARE TO BE GIVEN TO THE BRANCH TO BE SENT TO ONTARIO COMMAND, WITH A COPY OF MINUTES AND FINANCIALS SENT TO THE LADIES AUXILIARY PROVINCIAL COMMAND. We find out an Auxiliary has closed when we receive notification that Ontario Command has received a Charter with absolutely no paper work. A letter must also accompany the Charter should the Branch like the Charter returned.



I am pleased to announce that with the help of the Ladies Auxiliary Zone E-4 Commander, we have revived Port McNicholl Branch 545 Ladies Auxiliary. We have also heard and are awaiting word that West Ferris Branch 559 has also been successful in forming a Ladies Auxiliary. If you are considering adding or reopening an Auxiliary, contact our Provincial Secretary – Kim Adams, she will gladly pass on the requirements necessary to open an Auxiliary, and all Provincial Officers are available to help.

1st Vice President Sharon Crown and I were pleased to represent L.A. Command at the November PEC meeting in Aurora.
