PHASE 1: 2020

In 2020, following our National Service Dog Conference held in Victoria, we welcomed Fire Team K9 located in Pembroke, ON as a Probationary WWC Funded SD Provider. Initial pairings are promising as we look to the maturing of this provider.

PHASE 2: 2021

One of the key outcomes from our recent Service Provider (SD) Conference was that all programs actively training SD's, have committed to pursue ADI accreditation. Our two senior SD Providers: VICD and NSD will mentor the other providers. This is a positive development as it will raise the bar when it comes to standards, provide international mobility to SD pairings and provide additional program development mentoring along with an addition layer of professional accountability.



PHASE 3: 2022

Following the pattern established at our National Service Dog Conference in 2020, we are excited to welcome K9 Country Inn, from Meaford, ON, as a Probationary **WWC Funded Service Dog** Provider. Operation Service Dog is a prime example of what can be accomplished when organizations work together: cooperation in training, support, international recognition, and integrity. The Ontario Command and Wounded Warriors Canada partnership defines what it means to be #InThisTogether for the mental health of our Veterans and their families.



THE PARTNERSHIP

In April 2018, The Royal Canadian Legion Ontario Provincial Command, partnered with Wounded Warriors Canada (WWC) following the launch of the national WWC PTSD Service Dog Program.

Stability in funding ensures
Veterans are paired with Dogs
meeting the criteria for WWC
service dogs, including ethical
training standards for dogs, client
and service dog teams, client
service and aftercare, financial
transparency, and insurance
coverage.

Wounded Warriors Canada's
Service Dog Program is currently
tracking the placement of 60
PTSD Service Dogs to Veterans
nationally through Certified
Service Dog Providers in this
fiscal year; a further 43 dogs are
in training and providers are
allowing for new applicants due to
the stable and consistent funding.
